## President's Letter

In 2017-2018, The London Potters Guild (LPG) was once again awarded operational grant funding from London Arts Council (LAC) and Ontario Arts Council (OAC). The funds helped us pay our Administrator and Studio Technician to keep things running smoothly at London Clay Art Centre (LCAC). Special projects that were funded through grants beginning in 2016-17 extended into fiscal 2017-18. Their implementation and wrap-up made for a very busy end-of-calendar-year 2017. Other grants allowed us to make some significant changes at LCAC.

In the late fall, the intrepid team of Susan Day, Beth Turnbull Morrish, and Rob Hodson completed our unique Canada 150 Celebration mosaic project over an eightmonth period. With the invaluable help of 80 other LPG members who volunteered a total of 880 hours, they designed, made, glazed, and fired more than 18,000 clay tiles


produced with the participation of 650 individuals from 25 community groups. The colourful mosaic is installed on what used to be a non-descript cinderblock wall at LCAC.

The installation and celebration event took place November 30, 2017 with more than 400 people in attendance, including many who had participated in tile-making events as well as funder representatives and local dignitaries. This exciting legacy project and art installation is now a permanent public art feature on the east exterior wall of our amazing facility. The monumental Ontario and Canada 150 Mosaic is yet another example of the vibrant revitalization that is happening in London's Old East Village and will be a source of pride for generations to come.

In December 2017, we held a public awareness event to share the accessibility improvements at LCAC made possible through funds awarded by the Rick Hansen Foundation as part of its Access4All Canada 150 Signature Project. The money allowed us to enhance accessibility features at LCAC such as automatic door openers on the red fire doors on the first floor, sound abatement panels throughout the second floor, software and hardware that provides closed-captioning for students or members with hearing impairments, and an accessible potter's wheel.

At our 2017 holiday gathering, I was thrilled to announce the awarding of a \$297,000 Grow Grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF). Earmarked for capital and human resource expenses from January 2018-20, the funds will allow us to fulfill the grant's outcome of "enriching people's lives through arts, culture and heritage, by helping more people access arts-based learning opportunities and compelling artistic, cultural and heritage experiences." We committed to engaging an additional 480 participants in clay art classes and workshops over the grant's two years by optimizing the use of programming space, adding essential equipment, and putting in place the necessary human resources to enable the continuation of a broad array of program offerings for the public.

We were finally able to complete the vision of the 2008 master plan for LCAC by installing the partition wall on the second floor. It will allow us to simultaneously provide programming in the handbuilding classroom and meeting area. The slab roller, extruder, pug mill, and extra kilns and wheels give us greater capacity that will endure for years to come.

We passed an important organizational milestone and in June 2018, we hired another staff person as our first full-time Program Coordinator. Peg Dunnem's role is to build upon the extraordinary work done by our previous volunteer coordinators to increase programming and revenue for LCAC.

In the middle of all this amazing activity, it quickly became apparent that our kiln room could not keep up with the increase in capacity. To address the health and safety concern posed by the old deficient ventilation system the LPG Board hired engineering consultants and eventually a qualified HVAC contractor to complete an extensive renovation. Although the process extended for many weeks, rendering the kiln room unusable, and the final cost was significant, we now have a ventilation system that efficiently removes noxious air and draws safe, clean air from outside.

The LPG continued to engage the community with outreach efforts. Our members participated in Culture Days, Home County Music and Art Festival, and the annual Harvest Festival and Pow Wow held at the Ontario Museum of Archeology, a celebration of aboriginal art, music, and culture.

## **Empty Bowls**

Empty Bowls 2018 was a great success! Hosted by Growing Chefs! Ontario and Bridges out of Poverty | Circles, our members contributed almost 700 bowls to set a new record for most amount raised over \$22,000! The two recipient organizations also raised about \$2000 each from their silent auction tables. They had a wide range of items—from potted succulent bowls to cooking lessons, to tickets for the Grand Theatre and the London Knights games. Both organizations were thrilled and amazed by the

results and impressed by the members of The London Potters Guild. The quality and design of the bowls were truly stellar and the number of volunteers who stepped up to set up, wash bowls, serve soup, and tear down was greatly appreciated.

## Artist-in-Residence (AIR)

The AIR program was created to provide professional studio space to up-and-coming clay artists in exchange for 5 hours per week of studio technician support at London Clay Art Centre. Our residency programs allow clay artists to pursue their artistic endeavours while working in a state-of-the-art studio and contributing to the community of fellow artists.

Daumante Stirbyte, the first International Artist-in-Residence, at the LCAC comes from Lithuania (by way of Ireland). Dauma has taught classes and workshops, participated in exhibitions, LCAC's Spring and Fall shows, donated pottery to fundraisers and volunteered for the annual Empty bowls event, was a guest speaker at HB Beal, attended Fusion conference in Waterloo, and had a piece of work 'Inflorescence' at the Breakthrough exhibition, Robert Langen Gallery where she was awarded Best in Show.

"I've always been fascinated with the natural world and the unusual creatures with whom we share the planet. My research often delves into deep sea exploration, various insects or microscopic close ups of the plant and animal



world - things that often go unseen or unnoticed. My work is highly detailed and delicate and I mostly work with porcelain. I aim to instill a sense of curiosity and wonder in the viewer - as well as explore the notion of the 'unknown' through unexpected combinations of shapes, colour and surface treatments. Blurring the lines between reality and fantasy, the work is intended to suggest an eerie possibility of life forms we are not aware of. Familiar yet uncomfortable, my creatures are much like unusual specimens at a natural history museum."



# Nicole Waddick Tenacity Exhibition

This exhibition of sculptural stoneware vessels by Nicole Waddick was created during a two year artist residency at the LCAC. The work celebrates the beauty of Southwestern Ontario's rural landscape throughout the seasons. The vessels echo the gentle hills and valleys of the upper Thames River watershed. The surfaces and colours of the pottery correspond to the vegetation, both wild and cultivated, of the region.


## Programming




## Retail Store
