LPG History

Did you know that the LPG has been involved in the Empty Bowls fundraising initiative in London for over 20 years?

Empty Bowls is an international program that supports food-related charities around the world and has raised millions of dollars to aid in the fight against hunger. The event was founded by Lisa Blackburn and art teacher John Hartom in 1990-91 when they joined a drive to raise charitable funds in John's Michigan community. Hartom's idea was to organize a charitable event to give artists and art students a way to make a personal difference. Hartom's students made ceramic bowls in their high school art classes. The finished products were then used as individual serving pieces for a fund-raising meal of soup and bread. Contributing guests kept the empty bowl. During the next year, Hartom and other participants developed this concept into "Empty Bowls" (Wikipedia).

In the earlier years in London, the LPG supported the efforts of the main organizer, the Unitarian Fellowship. LPG members made bowls and donated them to the Fellowship while their congregants did the rest. 2006 may have been the last year the Fellowship ran Empty Bowls in London. The event disappeared only to be resurrected in 2013 by LPG member Judy Sparkes. Judy was unaware of the LPG's history with the event. It was only by virtue of her passion for food combined with her love of clay that the LPG became the de facto "host" organization. Strictly speaking Empty Bowls does not reflect the LPG's charitable purpose, but the synchronicity between the event and our medium is undeniable.

In 2013, Empty Bowls funds were donated to the Ark Aid Mission, one of our close neighbours in the Old East Village (OEV). In 2014, proceeds were donated to the Country Cupboard Food Bank at Regional HIV/AIDS Connection, and this year the funds were donated to the El Sistema music program run out of Aeolian Hall, another close neighbour and collaborator in the OEV.

LPG members will be proud to know that through their efforts, the last three Empty Bowls have raised and donated \$26,000 to other local charities!

Frequently Asked Question

Q: Do the hours I spend working on Empty Bowls count toward my requirement to fulfill two hours a month of work for the LPG?

A: This is a tough one to answer, but here it goes...

The LPG is a charity whose purpose is "the advancement of education". We fulfill our charitable purpose by offering access to classes, workshops, studio space,

instructional opportunities, etc. For 35 years, we have relied on our members to provide labour toward operating the organization and its facilities. We could not have achieved what we have without hundreds of thousands of hours committed to building the LPG's programming and infrastructure.

Other charities in the city were established with "the relief of poverty" as their charitable purpose or driving force. Similarly, these organizations could not continue to exist without significant volunteer commitment. Imagine if all or many of the volunteers for charity A suddenly decided to put their efforts toward charity B; charity A would soon be facing a crisis and find itself unable to fulfill its purpose.

Empty Bowls is a brilliant initiative for an exceedingly worthy cause. Its formula melds naturally with our talents as clay artists and its mandate is easy to support because it addresses the essential needs of people in our community. Empty Bowls has provided exposure for the LPG, which in all likelihood has brought customers to our store and students to our classes. From that standpoint, the involvement of LPG members in organizing Empty Bowls is bringing benefit to the LPG/LCAC. But, it must be acknowledged that Empty Bowls also requires significant time, energy, and resources that are not directly benefitting the everyday operations of LCAC.

The tough part is that over the years, we have erroneously referred to the members' commitment of two hours a month toward the LPG/LCAC as volunteer time when, in fact, two hours a month is a mandatory requirement of studio membership. Running the organization as a collective or cooperative has allowed us to continue to offer very affordable memberships - \$20 a month! We need each member's effort to help us run the Centre and the LPG because we are not in a position to hire full-time staff to cover all the myriad needs of the facility and its members.

In addition, we have a responsibility to our fun-

ders to make efforts to raise money that directly funds LPG/LCAC's operations. Funders are asking, "If you can mount the effort to raise money for other charities outside of your charitable purpose, why can't you raise money for yourselves?" This is a very valid question and one we need to address by striking a fundraising committee for the LPG/LCAC.

With all that said, we respectfully ask that you fulfill your requirement of 2 hours a month toward the LPG and LCAC operations and consider all the additional time you spend in supporting the LPG/LCAC and Empty Bowls as your volunteer contribution.

Please enter your monthly hours contribution in the log book and make a specific "Empty Bowls" notation for hours spent supporting the event. That way, we can track the time commitment being made by LPG members toward Empty Bowls as well as the required hours and additional volunteer time.

Membership

Become a Gold Member!

Two years ago we implemented an additional membership tier called the Gold Membership. The intention is to recuperate money in place of the required time commitment of 2 hours per month. The additional funds can then be put toward additional hours for paid staff.

For those of you who want to continue using the fabulous facilities at London Clay Art Centre, but find it very difficult to fulfill the time requirement, a Gold Membership will remove the obligation of time toward extra cleaning, loading kilns, mixing glazes, etc.

This is the cost structure for purchasing a Gold Membership for an individual:

\$80 + HST for a regular guild membership, plus \$600 + HST for a studio membership at the Gold level

TOTAL: \$680 + HST

You must also purchase shelf space at a cost of \$30 + HST per unit annually as well as your own clay at:

\$27 for sleeve of mid-smooth stone studio clay \$54 for a box of mid-smooth stone studio clay \$29 for sleeve of specialty clay \$58 for box of specialty clay It's not too late to become a Gold Member! Volunteer Hours Tracking

Thank you to all of the members who are regularly tracking their hours in the volunteer book in the store. The information collected will be inputted into the data base each month. Having a record of your hours is helpful in many ways which goes beyond tracking for funding purposes. We get a better picture of: who is engaged in what activities; where the gaps may be; and the level to which members are involved in operations. All of this assists with planning future and current staffing levels to cover any gaps in operations. With the help of webmaster Jonathan Dueck and artistin-rResidence, Nicole Waddick, we are working toward a way to make this process accessible online. Stay tuned for more information.

Volunteer Recognition

Each month, all members who have entered their volunteer hours will have their names placed into a draw for two pugs of free reclaim clay. Cathy Regan and Edward Yamamoto were the winners for October. Cathy and Edward help out in a variety of tasks including: pugging clay; cleaning, and assisting with classes and drop-ins.

Orientation Session for New Members

A streamlined 1.5 hour orientation session has been organized to:

provide a historical and technical tour of the building; inform members about their obligations regarding voluntary service;

obtain health and safety information; and get matched to a team.

Each new member has the opportunity to request a mentor by completing a mentee form. The orientation is a collaboration between the Membership, Volunteer and Health and Safety Coordinators. If you would like to attend the next session, please contact Laila Brandt, Membership Coordinator.

Studio Team Assignment

All studio members who have completed a survey have been assigned to a team with a leader. Some teams will have more members than others. Each member has been assigned to an activity for which they have indicated an interest or in which they have participated in the past. The purpose of these allocations is to ensure that all studio members have a specific role in LCAC's operations. You'll find the cleaning team is comprised of the most members. It is the best spot for those who cannot commit to a regular schedule at the LCAC, so having them on the "Clean Team" is a win-win for all. As we know, no matter what time you come in there is always cleaning to do! may also notice some members names will show up in a few places because they tend to be associated with a number of tasks in the organization. In any case if you see any errors or omissions, please let me know and I will correct them -

nothing is set in stone.

Job Descriptions and Training Videos

As part of this project, a job description will be written for each volunteer position in the organization. To compliment the job descriptions, we will have training videos and how-to instructions for key positions. I am working with **Jonathan** Dueck to coordinate these training videos which will be uploaded onto the members' only section of the new website. The tools will be great refreshers for those who have completed the Studio Potters' Program and can serve to augment the training and mentoring the Team Leader will be providing. Studio Potter Program

The London Potters' Guild offers to its membership a *free* series of 4 Studio Potter Program sessions educating our membership on the theoretical and practical aspects of studio practice. The following

is a brief description of the various sessions along with the dates and times that they are offered. Members can register for a session by either signing up on the sign-up sheet that is posted on the back bulletin board by the red doors or email epakalnis3@execulink.com. Please note that new studio members must take at least 1 session per year. Completion of the 4 sessions along with committing 4 volunteer hours to the tasks of a session, plus teaching another member how to do the tasks taught at one of the sessions, will result with the London Potters' Guild Studio Potter Program Certificate.

Studio and Equipment Maintenance for January 31st, 1-4 p.m. with Sandy Harquail

Participants will learn the significance of keeping the studio clean to prevent silicosis, a hazardous lung condition. Since there is dust (silica) generated by working with clay, it is critical that the clay dust is removed as much as possible. As a hands on session, members will be responsible for cleaning various parts of the studio spaces with the following practice in mind "Spray, Mop, Rinse and Repeat" as well as learn how to take apart, repair and reassemble the wheelhead and pedal of the potter's wheel.

Kiln Loading and Unloading, February 28th, 1-4 p.m. with Chris Snedden

Once our pieces are ready to be fired, our next step is to learn how to load and unload the kilns for maximum results. This session will teach participants the nuances of kiln loading and unloading as well as how to set the kiln controller for bisque and glaze firings. Kiln maintenance will incorporate shelf care and how to clean the kiln.

Glaze Making, March 20th, 1-4 p.m. TBA

Participants will learn the essential ingredients to create glazes and the significance of silica, fluxes, stabilizers, and colorants. The hands on approach to this session will include making a glaze and being familiar with how to measure and calculate the amount required to make a glaze. Glaze maintenance will consist of checking where the glazes are located, ensuring

there is enough of an ingredient, ensuring the glazes are labeled and then cleaning the glaze surfaces.

Reclaim, April 24th, 1-4 p.m. with Pauline Durham

Since the London Clay Arts Centre generates a lot of clay to be reclaimed, participants will learn how to recycle clay for reuse and how to use the pugmill. Various phases of reclaim and the best methods of reclaiming clay will be discussed.

Studio Safety
