NOTE FROM THE CHAIR

Sometimes we don't take time to reflect on how far we have come in such a short while. Here is a brief look at some of the things we've accomplished over the summer...

At the Fusion inaugural Emerging Artist Breakthrough Exhibition in June, 45 artists submitted 126 pieces from across Canada for consideration, and 28 artists were invited to exhibit - six of whom come from the London Potters Guild - Daumante Stirbyte, Jordan Scott, Zara Gardner, Evan Morris, Evan Wasse and Hannah Pruder. We are proud to announce that Daumante Stirbyte won Best of Show and Zara Gardner won the Craft Ontario Professional Membership Award. Congratulations to all who participated!

As part of the Neighbourhood Decision Making Program from the City of London, Susan Day and Beth Turnbull Morrish led an intensive 2-day workshop in August where they shared their tile application secrets while installing a mosaic on the exterior wall of the building on the corner of Adelaide and Marshall Street. In the years to come, this will be seen by thousands of passersby, showcasing the amazing work of our ceramic artists here in Old East Village. Be sure to check it out in the evening as it sparkles in the headlights of passing cars.

In construction news, there are three items of note: 1) The preparatory work for the retractable partition wall on the second floor has been completed. All that remains is the installation of the actual sliding doors themselves and partition glass above. 2) In September, installation work will begin on the new ventilation system for the kiln room . (3) Design work is presently underway for the new Executive Director's office, which will be built in the desk area across from Cheryl's office.

Your Board of Directors will be focusing on three priorities this fall: 1) Celebrating our Members, 2) Supporting our Staff, and 3) Strengthening our Board. We'll keep sharing more exciting details with you as they develop.

September is the start of our busy autumn season. Keep up the good work! And we'll see you at the Potluck and Celebration of our Members on Sept 11.

WILD CLAY

Earth & Fire: The Craft & Form of Ontario Earthenware Pottery Traditions

This Summer a number of the London Potters Guild Members, archaeologists, and other interested people participated in a workshop to explore the early Ontario traditions of working with clay. They harvested "wild" clay from local rivers and streams, processed it to take out rocks and debris, made pots out of it and fired them in as traditional a way as possible.

Please join us on Thursday, September 6th from 7:00 - 8:00 p.m. to celebrate the opening of Earth & Fire: The Craft & Form of Ontario Earthenware Pottery Traditions. Opening remarks at 7:15 p.m.

Archaeologists recognize pottery of many shapes, sizes, and purposes as one of the most common artifacts found on archaeological sites, almost anywhere in the world. Made of earth and hardened by fire, fragments of pottery can endure as archaeological evidence for thousands of years, providing insight into domestic foodways and an artisanal craft that continues to thrive today. Explore the heritage of pot-making in Ontario as we showcase the materials and processes involved in making earthenware pottery through the perspectives of an Archaeologist, a Traditional Knowledge Keeper, a Potter – and the participants of an Earthenware Pottery workshop co-hosted by FUSION: The Ontario Clay and Glass Association and the Museum of Ontario Archaeology during the summer of 2018. The experimental archaeology approach of the workshop brought traditional methods to life through the contemporary experiences of workshop participants who harvested their own clay and fired their own pots in an outdoor fire pit.

Mosaic Updates

From Beth Turnbull Morrish & Susan Day

We worked on 3 mosaics this season. The workshop mosaic at the corner of Adelaide and Marshall Streets was the first to go up. On August 11& 12 we hosted our first Mosaic Methods Installation Workshop where we shared all our tricks and tips. Each participant worked on their own section of the mosaic and it came together beautifully. The mosaic on Marshall Street should be finished this weekend and the Elizabeth Street one (NW corner of Dundas and Elizabeth) is started. It is a much smaller mosaic at "only" 113 square feet. Both the Marshall and Elizabeth mosaics are "Wayfinders" projects. These projects were winning proposals in the 2017 Neighbourhood Decision Making contest through a London city-wide voting process.

Next up are the Gateways for the parking lot behind the Clay Art Centre. The city created 4 concrete structures at entrances to the lots which will be beautified with mosaics.

Hundreds of handmade tiles have been created, first by carving originals, then casting those in plaster and finally press-molding multiples from those molds. The imagery is a collection of humans and our natural world, like local flora and fauna, juxtaposed with technological imagery, such as Wi-Fi symbols, cellphones, rocket ships, bitcoins, and so much more. The lettering was extruded from our pugmill through dies created for this project.

Lead artist and Coordinator for these projects is Susan Day, assisted by Beth Turnbull Morrish and Kerri Jerome. Many volunteers helped at all stages along the way, from tile creation to kiln loading to installation.

Tiles for the Gateway project have also been created at various workshops for community partners, such as Big Brothers and Sisters, Eagle Heights students and CMHA.

Studio News:

Good news and bad news!

The Bad News is that Andrew Kellner, our hardworking studio tech, has left us for greener pastures. We will miss him and hope he drops in to see the new kiln room. And the good news.



After sweltering all summer and being gassed by kiln emissions while loading and unloading kilns and not being able to fire more than 2 kilns at once - we are going to get our kiln room ventilation system upgraded. Yahoo!!!!!!!!! Starting next week at 8am Tuesday, Sept 4th construction of the new HVAC systems for the kiln room will start.

Access through the building will be limited until the work is done. Construction should take anywhere from two to three weeks. (Starting September 4 to between September 14 and 21)

The last day to load and fire kilns is Saturday, Sept 1st, then all kilns must and will be emptied Monday, Sept 3rd. All shelving in the kiln room/ bisque and glaze holding area will be stored in the conference/library room and hand building upstairs.

The Loading dock area/and hallway to the kiln room will be **closed** until the construction is complete. During construction, the only access to the main floor studio will be through the store. Access to the second floor will be by the stairway to the left of the store, and the back entrance up the stairs and by the lift from the parking lot level.

All Construction is scheduled to be completed for the start of fall classes and in time for members to get work ready the fall classes and sale.

Please note: Parking may be limited.

Sorry, for short notice. When this is complete, all kilns will be able to be fired at once!! Front load kiln will be operational!! Thank you for your patience.

LIBRARY NEWS

Books donated to the library this past month.

We at the LPG have been the fortunate recipients of the entire ceramics library collection of Barbara Blackburn of Sarnia. Barbara was a former member of the London Potters Guild and the Sarnia Guild. She has unfortunately had some shoulder issues which have stopped her pottery making and she has now taken up painting.

We received almost 100 books and a large number of magazines. By the time you read this all the books will have been catalogued and put up on the library shelves. The books cover the gamut of clay work, sculpture, wheel and hand-building, decoration, firing and glazing techniques as well as some more specialized topics such as porcelain doll making etc. This is a very valuable addition to our library and I encourage all of you to make use of them.

The cataloging of books is not done by the usual decimal system but by topic and each (fairly broad) topic has been assigned a coloured dot on the spine. This should make it easier for you to figure out where to put the books you have returned.

For example:

Yellow dot-sculpture

Green dot-glazes and glaze-making

Red dot—general pottery making books covering a wide range of ceramic techniques

Yellow dot with a green circle—special techniques Etc.

STUDIO POTTER PROGRAM

Studio Potter Program

The Studio Potter Program is a free educational opportunity for the LPG membership to learn about the integral aspects of safe studio practice. Each session will have a theoretical and practical component to them. The Studio Maintenance session will emphasize the importance of cleanliness of one's work environment in a studio to prevent silicosis. The Kiln Loading and Firing session will differentiate the ways a kiln is loaded depending on whether one is placing greenware or glazed pieces in the kiln to be fired, the different firing settings, how to unload the kilns and how to maintain the kiln shelves. The Glaze Making session will provide information on how to make glazes and the integral ingredients required to make stable glazes. Finally, the Reclaim Session will demonstrate the various ways that members can recycle their own clay and use the pug mill to recycle larger volumes of clay.

Members will benefit in two ways from participating in these sessions since you will be able to apply the knowledge to set up your own studio eventually and to contribute toward volunteer hours at the LCAC.

LPG TRIP TO GARDINER MUSEUM

Six LPG members led by the intrepid Robin Chacko made a visit to the Gardiner Museum in Toronto. As well as the very interesting permanent exhibitions of Central and South American pottery and European ceramics, there was an exhibition called "Recent Histories" which is a project that examines how cultural knowledge is passed on . Louis Esme (a Mi'kmag Acadian – Irish) and Titiesg Wicinimintowak have created 8 distinct clay areas to represent the 8 Mi'kmaq districts. They feature conical vessels that reference ancestral Wabanaki forms. They tip the pot of colonial niceties towards the earth/water/sky, making something new from the old elements in the shadow of institutional collecting. Esme works to highlight the brilliance of local indigenous artists from the Dish with One Spoon. Their Mi'kwaw pots intend to hold the complexities of being here and home at the same time.

Always a fun event, Doors Open London gives us a great opportunity to welcome new people to the London Clay Art Centre, folks who maybe don't feel comfortable coming through the door on a normal day but are, however, curious; or those who live elsewhere in the city and have ventured into OEV for the event. Doors Open gives us a chance to tour visitors through the building and to frankly brag a bit about this amazing place. People bring their children for a clay-making experience, they learn about the Centre and what we offer to people of all ages, and they come away amazed at all that is happening here!

Each year for Doors Open we have an added extra—such as the Mosaic Project last year—so that people who have visited our space before will have a reason to come again.
